Branch Activates Website

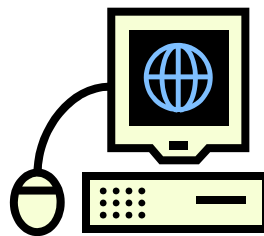

Discrimination Complaints Update

Helping resolve discrimination complaints is an important function of this Branch. Here are some things we've done for complainants:

1. Through written documents we were able to assist a complainant in receiving over \$60,000 in a settlement.

2. We assisted a complainant who was suspended from his job to instead receive a cash award and a reversal of the suspension.
3. Assisting a complainant who was told he had a debt with Social Security we were able to get the debt reversed.

4. Working with a complainant who was suspended for 10 days from his job we were able to get the 10 day suspension mitigated to five days.
5. Helped numerous complainants frame their case before the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

What Makes a Good Discrimination Complaint?

Have you been discriminated against? How can you tell and can you prove it? These are the first two questions asked when you come into the San Antonio Branch office of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). It is one thing to say you have been discriminated against but it another thing to prove it.

If you want to file a complaint of discrimination and prevail you should have the following

information at your finger tips:

1. The name address and phone number of the discrimination party.
2. The date(s) and time of the incident.
3. The names and contact information of all individuals that witnessed the event.
4. Know what you would like the local Branch to do for you.
5. Know what remedy you would want.
6. If you have any documentation to support your position bring it with you.

It is important to note that the local NAACP Branch can not represent you in any legal proceeding. If you are seeking advice and guidance we can help. But if your complaint gets to the point you want to sue or you have to go to court we can not represent you. Having said that you may say "Well what can you to for me?" The answer to that question is "We don't know what we can do for you until we review your situation.

Time really flies when every day is filled with opportunities and transitions. I appreciate the opportunity to serve as President of the San Antonio Branch. Our Branch was organized in 1918 and we are currently in our 90th year as a part of the oldest and most effective civil rights organization in the world. We are fortunate to have four past presidents alive and well: Mr. Joseph Luter (1959-1968), Mrs.

Ethel Minor (1987-1996 and 2002-2006), Mr. Oliver Hill, (1997-1998), and Mr. Thomas C. Rockeymore (1999-2001).

The NAACP was founded in 1909 and will hold the 99th Annual Convention in Cincinnati, Ohio July 12-17, 2008. Plans are already underway for the 100th Annual Convention to be held in New York City.

In over 90 years, the mission of the NAACP remains to ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights of all persons and to eliminate racial hatred and racial discrimination. The goals of the Branch are aligned with the National Office; however, we have asked the Committee Chairpersons to develop a strategic plan to accomplish their objectives. A major step in a discernment process is for everyone to have a clear perception of the options before them.

Education: Sam Houston HS Launches High-Tech Learning

The MET is an exciting new initiative at Sam Houston High School that incorporates pathways for students to follow their aspirations in the fields of high-tech manufacturing, engineering, and technology.

MET – which stands for Manufacturing, Engineering, and Technology – is the result of SAISD partnerships with the

Alamo Community Colleges, the Alamo Area Academies, St. Philip's College, Project Lead the Way, the National Academies Foundation, and the National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering. These partnerships will create academies at Sam Houston this fall and professors from St. Philip's will teach students at the high school during their junior and

senior years.

Students will receive dual credit opportunities that can be applied toward an Associate's Degree, summer internships, and certifications to enter the workforce prepared to land those coveted high-skill, high-wage positions. The 2006 average yearly salary of high-tech manufacturing employees was \$41,496, 13% above the San Antonio average, according to the San Antonio Manufacturers Association.

their connection with PLTW, Sam Houston was invited to become one of only four members in Texas of the National Academy Foundation (NAF).

Sam Houston already offers pathways such as Media Technology, Information Systems, Allied Construction and Hospitality and Tourism. These programs serve to provide Sam Houston students with a variety

of options when choosing what they want to do with their future.

At NAF Academies the graduation rate of more than 90 percent is far above the 50 percent average in urban areas – proving that the NAF model works. In addition, more than 80 percent of NAF graduates go on to college. SAISD





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NAACP Puts Major Focus on Health

Health in minority communities is a major concern of the NAACP. It is a glaring example of how historical disparities can converge to needlessly shorten the lives of many and degrade the quality of life for many more. It is a critical element on the path toward political, educational, social, and economic equality.

The NAACP has targeted five areas where health among minorities lags behind the general population and has specified a goal in each area.

Ensure access to high-quality affordable healthcare. Minorities are less likely to be insured and more likely to receive substandard care than non-minorities even when access-related factors, such as patients' insurance status and income, are controlled.

Eliminate disparities in HIV/AIDS. There are now an estimated 1.3 million Americans

with HIV; nearly half of them are Black. African Americans represent over 51% of the new HIV infections in the United States.

Reduce obesity disparities and related diseases—diabetes, hypertension, and heart disease. The alarmingly high number of overweight Black men and women contributes to why we lead in many statistics for obesity-related conditions, like diabetes, heart disease, and cancer.

Promote the development of good mental health practices and programs. Mental health needs for minorities are more likely to go unfilled. The quality of the care received is often poorer.

Reduce disparities in respiratory diseases. Despite similar rates of smoking, African Americans are much more likely to develop and die from lung cancer.

The NAACP is emphasizing the importance of learning your health status by seeking out health screening opportunities for blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol levels, and HIV testing. If you smoke cigarettes, quitting will give you the biggest health benefit.

Under the guidance of Health Committee Chair, Mrs. Deloris Mosley, San Antonio Branch actively supports these health initiatives and programs, and tries hard to promote the message in the minority community.
